SB 5057: Creating a work group to evaluate the costs of the state energy

The Clean Buildings Act addresses the rapidly growing emissions of the existing buildings sector; delaying compliance will make it harder for Washington to meet its climate targets.

- This bill creates confusion because the Board of Natural Resources already has authority to create rules and approval processes for the leasing of state lands.
- It also diminishes existing authority by excluding agricultural and grazing leases from carbon sequestration opportunities.



SB 5309: Eliminating the state public utility tax deduction for the instate portion of interstate transport of petroleum products and crude oil.

• Eliminates a public utility tax benefit for crude oil and petroleum products moving in the state.

Senate Committee on Environment, Energy & Technology: Public Hearing, Wednesday, 1/25 SB 5369: Reassessing standards for polychlorinated biphenyls in consumer products

- Directs Ecology to petition USEPA to reassess its PCB regulations under the toxic substances control act and to establish restrictions on the use of PCBs previously considered inadvertent in consumer products
- Addresses the problems of PCBs in products that impact humans and also get into the environment through disposal and recycling (specifically in discharges)



Senate Committee on Agriculture, Water,

SB 5372: Authorizing the department of natural resources to create and manage a trust land transfer program.

• Revitalizes a tool used to identify state trust lands that either do not have productive timber lands or would underperform economically and manage these lands for conservation, wildlife habitat, clean water, or recreational opportunities, all while ensuring the beneficiaries are made whole.

Natural Resources & Parks: Public Hearing, Thursday, 1/26 • When combined with funding, communities will have a stronger say in the future of state trust lands and open space, often near under-served or rapidly urbanizing areas.
