#### HB 1047: Concerning the use of toxic chemicals in cosmetic products.

- The bill bans PFAS, formaldehyde, lead and other harmful chemicals in personal care products and cosmetics that threaten health and disproportionately impact women of color.
- The bill also requires the hazards of other cosmetic ingredients to be assessed and provides incentives for small businesses to transition to safer products.





# HB 1131: The WRAP Act: Improving Washington's solid waste management outcomes.

- One of four <u>environmental community priorities</u> for 2023
- Modernizes Washington's recycling system, including incorporating a beverage redemption system and post-consumer recycled content mandates.
- Reduces excess packaging, increases recycling, refill and reuse, creates a uniform recycling list, and reduces costs for local governments and ratepayers.



House Committee on *Environment & Energy:* Executive Session, Thursday, 2/16



- Phases out the sales of mercury-containing light bulbs in WA and expands existing producer stewardship program to include most light bulbs.
- Would reduce exposure to fluorescent bulbs and tubes that contain mercury (a potent neurotoxin) and increase recycling of bulbs.



House Committee on Capital Budget: Executive Session, Thursday, 2/16

HB 1282: Requiring environmental and labor reporting for public building construction and renovation material.

- Creates a reporting system for the carbon footprint of building materials, worker information, and other datapoints like health certifications.
- The information and database created under the bill will help the state leverage its purchasing power to procure climate smart building materials that support workers.

**Possible Executive** Session

HB 1368: Requiring and funding the purchase of zero emission school buses.

- Protects public health and contributes to fighting climate change by requiring school buses purchased after Sept. 1, 2035, to be a zero emissions vehicle.
- Provides funding assurances to help school districts, state-tribal compact schools, and charter schools to aid in the transition.



House Committee on Local Government: Public hearing, Tuesday, 2/14

HB 1723: Concerning equity and environmental justice in the growth management act.

- Embeds equity and environmental justice across all other elements in the Growth Management Act.
- Aligns local planning with state environmental justice in the Healthy Environment for All (HEAL) Act.



HB 1735: Adding net ecological gain as a voluntary element of comprehensive plans under the growth management act.

House Committee on Environment and Energy: Executive Session, Monday, 2/13  Better integrates salmon recovery and land use planning by ensuring that public projects improve conditions for future generations of salmon and people.



HB 1740: Concerning eligibility, enrollment, and compensation of small forestland owners volunteering for participation in the forestry riparian easement program.

• The current form of the bill weakens protections of forest lands in riparian areas by creating a new exemption to forest practice rules and reducing the duration of an easement under the program.

House Committee on Agriculture & Natural Resources: Executive Session, Friday, 2/17



House Committee on Agriculture & Natural Resources: Public Hearing, Tuesday, 2/14. Possible Executive Session HB 1789: Expanding revenue generation and economic opportunities from natural climate solutions and ecosystem services.

- Authorizes DNR to pursue carbon and other ecosystem service projects on state lands, creating a new revenue stream for beneficiaries, contribute to reducing carbon in the atmosphere, and improve environmental health.
- Clarifies DNR's ability to sell carbon storage and other ecological services to support win-win-win outcomes for forests, beneficiaries, and communities.
