Senate Committee Environment, Energy, & Technology: Public Hearing, Tuesday, 3/14

Senate Committee Action

SHB 1047: Concerning the use of toxic chemicals in cosmetic products.

- The bill bans PFAS, formaldehyde, formaldehyde releasers, lead and other harmful chemicals in personal care products and cosmetics that threaten health and disproportionately impact women of color.
- The bill also requires the hazards of other cosmetic ingredients to be assessed and provides incentives for small businesses to transition to safer products.

HB 1176: Developing opportunities for service and workforce programs to support climate-ready communities.

- Establishes Washington climate corps network to support climate-related service opportunities for young adults and veterans.
- Creates a clean energy technology workforce advisory committee to support the expansion of clean energy economy.
