1997 Conservation Votes

1997 HOUSE & SENATE

SHB 1111 Water Amnesty

Granting water rights to certain persons who were water users before January 1,1993. This bill gives amnesty to those who used water illegally for irrigation stock watering and small scale water supply before 1993. This bill allows people who have illegally, and without a permit, used surface or ground water for irrigation or stock use to then obtain a permit with priority for water dating from when they began using the water illegally. Senate: Yeas 29, Nays 15. House: Yeas 69, Nay 29. A "nay" is a green vote. Passed by the House and Senate and then vetoed by the Governor.

2 2SHB 1866 Environmental Excellence

Allowing for the creation of environmental excellence program agreements. Allows the Department of Ecology to enter into Program Agreements with participating companies/facilities. This Program would allow participating facilities to be exempt from certain environmental laws to the extent they are covered in a Program Agreement, and would allow facilities to attempt non-regulated operating technologies. These technologies do not have to provide better environmental protection. House, 1st vote: Yea 69, Nay 29. Senate, Fairley Health Standards Amendment: Yeas 24, Nay 25. A "nay" vote in the House is a green vote, and a "yea" vote in the Senate is a green vote. Passed by the House and Senate, then Governor partially vetoed.

3 SHB 2054 Watershed Planning

Authorizing local watershed planning and modifying water resource management. This watershed planning bill became an omnibus bill that had contained not only a flawed planning section but a new 5000 gallon surface exemption, a major weakening of the PCHB authority to hear water cases, and language to overturn recent Supreme Court decision on irrigation rights. Senate: Yea 25, Nay 21, House: Yea 60, Nay 38. A "nay" vote is a green vote. Passed by the House and Senate, then Governor partially vetoed.

SSB 5325 Counties Forest/Trust Land

Allowing counties to have certain lands transferred from the state back to the county. Allowed counties to apply to the board of natural resources for the transfer of forest lands from the state back to counties for commercial forestry use, and that those lands must be managed to maximize financial benefits. Senate: Yea 32, Nay 17. House: Yea 59, Nay 36. A "nay"vote is a green vote. Passed by the House and Senate, then Governor vetoed.

5 SHB 1338 Growth Management

Increasing flexibility for counties and cities in implementing growth management. Counties under 75,000 population may opt out of all Growth Management Act requirements upon a vote of county commissioners. May adopt flex plans after conferring, but not

consulting, with cities. Opt out requires a 50% vote at a general election. House: Yea 58, Nay 40. Senate: Yea 26, Nay 23. A "nay" vote is a green vote. *This bill died in the House Rules Committee*.

HJM 4005 Hanford Reach Joint Memorial

Returning land within the Hanford control zone to agricultural and wildlife uses. The Hanford Reach Joint Memorial. This bill sends a message from the Washington State Legislature to the US Congress that the State Legislature supports returning protected land within the Hanford Reach to agricultural and development use. This sends the message that the Washington State Legislature supports development in spawning grounds for 80% of Columbia River fall chinook salmon. House: Yea 60, Nay 38. Senate: Yea 31, Nay 15. A "nay" vote is a green vote. Filed with Secretary of State.

7 HB 1576 **Buildable Lands**

Modifying buildable lands under growth management. Counties and cities must monitor actual development occurring with Urban Growth Areas (UGA). If a county or city is not meeting anticipated densities, then must adopt incentives to do so at least once every 5 years. Counties may opt to expand their UGA boundaries based on actual densities achieved and is required to do so if incentives fail. House: 62 Yea, 36 Nay. Senate: 29 Yea, 20 Nay. A "nay" vote is a green vote. The Governor vetoed this bill.

1997 SENATE ONLY

SHB 1474 SEPA Exemptions

Increasing categorical exemptions from SEPA. Exempts certain projects within the Urban Growth Areas from State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) threshold and Environmental Impact Statement determinations, including subdivisions up to 9 lots and housing projects up to 10 homes. Additional exemptions include construction of an office, school, commercial, recreational, service, or storage building with eight thousand or fewer square feet of gross floor area, and with associated parking facilities. Senate: Yea 31, Nay 18. A "yea" vote is a green vote. The Governor vetoed this bill.

SB 5758, Swecker Amendment 8, line 27, 29 Growth Management Act

Implementing the recommendations of the land use study commission. This amendment to the consensus bill to implement the recommendations of the Land Use Study Commission eliminated restrictive language relating to mixed development areas, and made allowances for future unplanned, not existing, uses of land. Senate: Yea 23, Nay 25. A "nay" vote was a green vote. This amendment did not pass the Senate floor.

10 SSB 5208 Environmental Complaints

Detailing how to handle environmental complaints. Establishes procedures to handle environmental complaints that include not letting the Department of Ecology enter on to land for inspection or enforcement without a warrant. Senate: Yea 33, Nay 16. A "nay" vote is a green vote. Passed the Senate and died in the House.

1998 Conservation Votes

1998 HOUSE ONLY

1 1 ESHB 2514 Watersheds Management

Providing for integrated watershed management. This bill attempted to lay a framework for local watershed planning. Decisions about water resource allocation, and possibly water quality and habitat, are to be determined by a decision making body representing vested interests in a watershed. The bill emphasizes planning over resource protection. House: Yeas 86, Nays 10. A "nay" is a green vote. Signed by Governor with partial vetoes.

12 SHB 2800 Water Rights

Prescribing procedures for temporary water rights for small cities. Defines the overriding public interest language which allows impairment to instream flow to include certain small cities (notably Black Diamond). This grants a permit denied because the applicant did not meet the existing requirement for showing an emergency. It would also permit permanent construction based on a temporary permit. House: Yeas 56, Nays 42. A "nay" is a green vote. Passed the House died in the Senate Agriculture and Environment Committee.

13 ESB 5185 Growth Management Hearings Boards

Revising procedures for growth management hearings boards. Substantially weaken the authority of the Growth Management Hearings Boards. Among other provisions, the bill would prohibit the Boards from determining the validity and invalidity of city or county comprehensive plans or development regulations. These changes would, for all practical purposes, take the accountability out of complying with the Growth Management Act. House: Yeas 56, Nays 40. A "nay" vote is a green vote. After passing the House and the Senate the Governor vetoed this bill.

1998 HOUSE & SENATE

ESSB 5703 Water Rights

Relating to granting water rights. This bill provided special rights for water users who have broken the law and have used water illegally prior to 1993. It provided water rights for these users that are not available to those who have applied for the right to use water and waited to use the water until they have been permitted by the state. Senate: Yeas 32, Nays 11. House: Yeas 65, Nays 30. A "nay" is a green vote. After passing the House and Senate the Governor vetoed this bill.

15 SSB 6474 Fertilizer Bill

Adopting the fertilizer regulation act. This legislation provides a false sense of security as it calls for fertilizers to meet Canadian standards, for only 9 heavy metals (without stating quantity), that are not based on risk to human health or agricultural soils. Rather,

these standards allow the application and accumulation of toxic chemicals and heavy metals, such as lead and dioxin, in soils over a period of time. The labeling requirements may also mislead farmers and gardeners into believing the fertilizers are safe. House: Yeas 73, Nays 24. Senate: Yeas 35, Nays 11. A "nay" vote is a green vote. Passed by the House and Senate and signed into law by the Governor:

16 E2SHB 2496 Salmon Recovery

Salmon recovery planning. The Buck/Romero bill. Intended to be the habitat project piece of a statewide salmon recovery strategy, the bill also establishes a governor's salmon office, sets up regional councils as a catalyst for habitat restoration efforts, provides for an independent science panel, and establishes critical path scheduling. This bill is an example of bi-partisanship that worked well. House: Yeas 98, Nays 0. Senate: Yeas 46, Nay 0. A "yea" vote is a green vote. Passed by the House and Senate and signed into law by the Governor:

17 SHB 2542 Growth Management Opt Outs

Allowing rural counties to remove themselves and their cities from planning requirements under the Growth Management Act. This bill lets all counties with a population under 50,000 opt-out of GMA regardless of their 10 year growth rates. Ten of the counties that this bill would allow to opt-out have a ten year 20% growth rate or higher. Allowing rural counties to opt out of the GMA at this stage wastes millions of tax dollars already spent for planning purposes and most of the counties have completed their GMA planning. House: Yeas 70, Nays 28. Senate: Yeas 30, Nays 18. A "nay" vote is a green vote. After the House and Senate passed this bill, the Governor vetoed it.

18 EHB 2894 Transportation Budget

Reallocating motor vehicle excise tax and general fund resources for the purpose of transportation and local criminal justice funding and tax reduction. This transportation package does not specify the types of projects that will be funded and diverts general fund money that currently pays for other important environmental programs. House: Yeas 56, Nays 41. Senate: Yeas 25, Nays 24. A "nay" vote is a green vote. Passed by the House and Senate and the Governor partially vetoed this bill, and the legislature sent other portions of this bill to a Referendum (49) vote o\f the public.

1998 SENATE ONLY

19 ESSB 6117 Support

Creating a salmon license buyback program. Established a way to reduce some salmon harvest pressures by providing a source of funds to compensate commercial fishers and charter boat license holders for the loss of their livelihood. Commercial salmon fisher and charter boat licenses can be purchased in return for the purpose of permanent cancellation of the license. Makes an appropriation of nineteen million dollars for the purposes of the act. Senate: Yeas 48, Nays 0. A "yea" vote is a green vote. Passed on the House and Senate floors, but died in the conference process.
